GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Performs investigative law enforcement supervisory work. Serves as a commissioned peace officer for the Office of Inspector General at the Juvenile Justice Department. Work involves administering the daily operations and activities of the facility investigative programs. Works under general supervision, with moderate latitude for the use of initiative and independent judgement.

EXAMPLES OF WORK PERFORMED

Oversees security and protective operations at the gatehouse and exterior properties surrounding the secure area of the facility.

Oversees and identifies incidents involving unauthorized entry, malicious mischief, escape, or other criminal violations; and performs or assists with reporting, confronting, apprehending, detaining, or arresting suspects as appropriate.

Plans, coordinates, and evaluates daily operations of agency facility security programs.

Provides guidance, technical assistance, and training to supervised staff as needed, including the integration of new methods and procedures; oversees the implementation of new processes.

Works closely with management; collaborates with facility administrators and juvenile correctional officers; and serves as a liaison with local, county, state, and federal law enforcement agencies.

Prepares and reviews investigative reports; informs agency management of findings.

Develops and executes agency recruitment and hiring for facilities.

Reports safety hazards and corrects them when possible; and completes required documentation for accidents or injuries within specified timeframes.

Performs related work as assigned.

GENERAL QUALIFICATION GUIDELINES

EXPERIENCE AND EDUCATION

Graduation from an accredited four-year college or university with major coursework in accounting, business, criminal justice, or a related field is generally preferred. Experience and education may be substituted for one another.

KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS, AND ABILITIES

- Knowledge of agency programs, policies, and facility rules; the criminal justice system
 and court procedures; investigative and law enforcement methods and practices;
 relevant local, state, and federal laws, including Texas Penal Code and the Code of
 Criminal Procedures, case law, and laws governing arrest, search, and seizure; rules of
 evidence; and regulations related to the abuse, neglect, exploitation, and mistreatment
 of youth or children.
- Skill in maintaining confidentiality and impartiality; using firearms, intermediate weapons,
 defensive tactics, and first aid; maintaining order and responding effectively in
 emergencies; organizing and completing tasks within deadlines; operating computers,
 standard office equipment, and applicable software; maintaining accurate written records
 and utilizing data reports for administrative purposes; interpreting and implementing
 rules, policies, and procedures; and analyzing, researching, and developing policy and
 procedure manuals.
- Ability to effectively lead security, investigative programs, and personnel; to secure and
 process crime scenes; to collect and preserve evidence; to conduct investigations and
 interviews; to prepare comprehensive reports, affidavits, warrants, and cases for
 prosecution; to respond appropriately in high-stress or confrontational situations; to
 interpret and apply laws and regulations; to uphold ethical standards and enforce
 policies and laws; to communicate effectively; and to supervise the work of others.

REGISTRATION, CERTIFICATION, OR LICENSURE

Must be licensed as a Texas peace officer by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement.

Must possess a valid driver's license.
